Education represents a key focus in this context, holding the potential to unlock Ukraine's success and prosperity.

We are grateful to our donors who have supported our independence since February 24, 2022. We are even more appreciative that many of you believe it is time to support the future by investing in people.

This year, the KSE Foundation awarded 329 grants to talented individuals affected by the war but determined to continue their development in Ukraine. Many of these individuals have lost loved ones in the war, many have parents currently defending and returned us. some have

from abroad, believing that Ukraine is their home.

This is more than just supporting education. It is a space where talents develop. This year, KSE University students have proven themselves to be a talented and caring community. Not only did they become the volunteer wing of the "ZAKHYSTOK: Safe Education" project, helping equip shelters in the de-occupied Kyiv region, but they also raised \$2 million for the purchase of helicopters for medical evacuation, potentially saving hundreds or even thousands of lives.

We are entering the third year of the war – a war for freedom and independence. It has been draining not just for our defenders but also for our partners and friends. February 24th is the day when Ukraine held Europe's borders firm. We are grateful that you are standing with us in maintaining them today.



When the parents of the students saw our old "shelter," they were frightened. Then they learned about the program from the KSE Foundation, and we applied. The shelter was repaired swiftly despite the problematic premises – there was a swamp instead of a floor, constant dampness, clay, and ground water flooding the basement. Now, there is a concrete screed and waterproofing, with quality ventilation. The basement was only 1.9 meters high, but now our shelter can simultaneously accommodate over 400 children. We are very grateful for everything done for the children.

Helicopters for medical evacuation fundamentally change the practice of transporting the wounded. For the first time, it was not charitable foundations or representatives of big business that responded to a request from the Defense Intelligence of Ukraine, but the community of students of the Kyiv School of Economics. I promise that every collected hryvnia will save our heroes' lives and bring victory closer.

Each of us entrants is experiencing immense stress. Some have parents fighting at the front, others have had their homes destroyed. Support is incredibly important.

We are all somewhat scarred by the war, as it brings blood, grief, tears, and sweat. The war forced me to learn how to quickly acquire new knowledge. Now, this skill will be useful in rebuilding the state thanks to my studies at KSE. Since 2015, I have been overseeing the operations of hospitals in 25% of the ATO (Anti-Terrorist Operation) zone and managed the treatment during the evacuation stages of wounded soldiers. I still continue to go on missions. But I am grateful for the opportunity to study and transition back to civilian life.




Your Impact: Stories Behind the Faces

Maiia Romanova,

Principal of the Gruzhchanska Gymnasium in the Kyiv region

In the spring of 2022, russians occupied neighboring villages, and we were cut off our electricity, phone connections, and heating. Food supplies in stores quickly ran out, and pharmacies were emptied of medicines. We were isolated from the civilized world. Refugees from neighboring villages came to us, they hid in our school shelter from enemy shelling, although there were hardly any conditions: the space was damp and unventilated. But when we were liberated, the KSE Foundation equipped this shelter for us - now all our children can use it, and we have fully resumed classes at school.

This young scientist is studying at one of the largest lyceums in the Poltava region – one of those where the KSE Foundation is finishing shelter renovations thanks to the contribution from the Olena Zelenska Foundation.

Our lyceum teachers always support and help us, but distance learning is very limiting limiting. It is especially tough for first graders, who are entering their classroom for the first time and starting their journey into formal education. But now, with the large equipped shelter, we will be able to fully attend school again.

His school switched to distance learning immediately after the start of the full-scale invasion. Thus, 1,200 talanted students and future inventors, like Bogdan, were limited in their ability to receive quality education.





The shelter will also provide protection for 60 little ones from the nearby kindergarten

The outpatient clinic in Makariv was destroyed by a direct missile hit on March 28, 2022. By April 2023, the KSE Foundation presented a fully restored the medical facility.

Your Impact: Stories Behind the Faces

Serhii Solomenko,

Director of the Makariv Medical Outpatient Clinic

When the Armed Forces of Ukraine finally liberated Makariv from the russians and explosives, we grasped the true extent of the destruction. The scene was appalling: it later turned out that not a single administrative building had survived intact.

Our doctors returned to the town, but there were neither premises nor equipment left – just ruins where the outpatient clinic once stood. However, thanks to the KSE Foundation and



the partners, donors of the initiative within a year our outpatient clinic was rebuilt and became the heart of medical assistance for the Makariv community.

The KSE Foundation became the first non-governmental charitable foundation that the Government involved in infrastructure recovery.



The outpatient clinic was rebuilt by the KSE Foundation in collaboration with the Ministry of Health, the Kyiv Regional Military Administration, local authorities, the clinic staff, and thousands of donors. Significant contributions were made by UKRGASBANK, Carlsberg Ukraine, VISA, Chernovetskyi Investment Group, Vodafone Ukraine, Energy Resources of Ukraine, SOCAR, with the design project created by Bogdanova Bureau.





Medical Equipment and Supplies

The war has significantly increased the strain on Ukraine's healthcare system. Assisting Ukrainian civilians affected by the war and defenders wounded on the front lines to recover more quickly and avoid complications is a crucial mission that Ukrainian medical professionals work on daily. Thanks to your support, their work becomes more effective.

Thanks to the contribution from FUIB in the spring of 2023, the KSE Foundation delivered a negative pressure wound therapy system to a field hospital in the Vinnytsia region.

This device accelerates the healing of wounds and burns of varying severity and has already aided dozens of defenders.

a surgeon

Nearly every soldier with an injury requires vacuum-assisted therapy, as currently, this treatment has no alternatives. With an increasing number of gunshot wounds and blast injuries, the VAC (Vacuum-Assisted Closure) device provided by the KSE Foundation has been incredibly helpful.

In collaboration with the British charity foundation Urgent Projects, the KSE Foundation delivered equipment to the Kropyvnytskyi Maternity Hospital, with a worth of nearly

\$43,000:

Phototherapeutic devices for treating severe cases of jaundice in newborns, a feeding incubator, a special transport incubator for newborns, syringe pumps, a blood gas analyzer with a year's supply of reagents, a biochemical analyzer with six months' worth of biochemical materials.





Liudmila Romaniv, General Director of the Kropyvnytskyi Maternity Hospital

When babies are born requiring surgical intervention or artificial lung ventilation, rapid and secure transportation becomes crucial during an air raid alert. We received from the KSE Foundation both transport incubators and neonatal, as well as other necessary devices. All of them save lives; there is not a single one that has not saved a life. The operation of our entire medical team depends on this equipment and how it functions.



Additionally, thanks to the support of Urgent Projects, the acute need for medical equipment was met for two Kharkiv hospitals on the railway transport of JSC "Ukrainian Railways" – Clinical Hospital No. 1 and Clinical Hospital No. 2.

The cost of equipment and supplies amounted to nearly

\$127,000

Among the devices provided are: a radiographic system, a blood gas analyzer, a yearly supply of reagent packaging 1150 ml, an Ottomed cauterization device, and a complete set of Ottomed instruments. This includes the OVP-S2+ video processor, OVG-S2+ gastrointestinal videoscope, OVC-S2+ Colono videoscope, and OLt leak tester.

8 pallets of medicines and medical supplies were delivered to the Professor Rudnev's Clinical Hospital of Mother and Child in Dnipro.

The total value of the donated medicines and consumables amounted to almost

\$59,000



This medical equipment and supplies help save the lives of newborns, surgical patients, and pregnant women.

Expanding the Network of Rehabilitation Spaces

Annually, around 200,000 patients in Ukraine require rehabilitation services. The KSE Foundation, in partnership with the Ministry of Health of Ukraine, signed a memorandum aimed at expanding the network of local outpatient rehabilitation departments – in hospitals located far from regional centers.



The initiative will facilitate access for civilians and defenders to therapeutic physiotherapy services and ensure their systematic provision.

The project is being implemented in partnership with the "Office of Professional Support for Recovery," a public organization specializing in the development of outpatient rehabilitation spaces in communities.



The first rehabilitation space was opened in the Tarashcha City Hospital in the Kyiv region



Equipment installation is being finalized at the Bohuslav Central Hospital

The initial results of the project became possible thanks to the contribution of Vodafone Ukraine.





I.IV. Rescue Missions and Aeromedical Evacuation

In rescuing the injured, timely medical assistance is a critical factor. Helicopters can reach even the most remote and inaccessible locations, making them indispensable for rescue operations on the battlefield and in front-line regions.

Students of the KSE University launched the "Donate to Evacuate" campaign to purchase helicopters for medical evacuation for the Defense Intelligence of the Ministry of Defense of Ukraine. The KSE Foundation and DefDev supported the initiative.

Helicopters can reach the most remote and hard-to-access locations, making them indispensable for rescue operations.

Unfortunately, in these hard-to-reach areas, especially those under constant shelling, many lives are lost not due to fatal injuries but because of the lack of timely, professional medical help. Aeromedical evacuation offers these individuals a chance. I want to thank all the donors



for their support and particularly to the KSE students for initiating the Donate to Evacuate project.

The names of everyone who supported the Donate to Evacuate initiative literally safeguard our wounded heroes. The Lopukhiny sisters, calligraphers applied a unique camouflage to the helicopter, featuring the names of the donors.

I.V. Humanitarian Demining

Clearing villages and towns from explosive items is a critical need to save lives in Ukraine. The KSE Foundation supports innovations in the field of humanitarian demining to provide developers with practical knowledge and opportunities for effective mine clearance. Currently, in Ukraine, approximately 174,000 km² of land are potentially contaminated with explosive hazards.

We have created an opportunity for developers to exchange experiences and ideas, challenging each other.



This helps understand how we can be useful to one another and how to develop the project further. For example, increasing the involvement of technology and reducing the direct presence of people to minimize the risk to individuals.



Our global goal is to make 80% of potentially mined territories safe for use within the next 10 years. To achieve this, we are working in several directions simultaneously.

This includes creating a competitive demining market, encouraging the development of machinery and equipment production in Ukraine, enhancing the capabilities of operators, and collaborating with donors.

II.I. Defense Training

One of the main priorities of the KSE Foundation is to ensure Ukrainian warriors have a technological edge on the battlefield. Thanks to targeted support, we finance the training of pilots for various types of reconnaissance drones.

Strategic investments are made within the "Army of Drones" project – a joint program of the Ministry of Defense, the Ministry of Digital Transformation, the General Staff of the Armed Forces of Ukraine, and the State Service for Special Communications and Information Protection of Ukraine, which the KSE Foundation donor community has joined.

Since the start of the full-scale war, the charitable foundation of the Kyiv School of Economics has purchased over 1,500 reconnaissance drones for Ukraine's defenders, saving hundreds of thousands of lives.

This was made possible thanks to UAV piloting training. Completing courses and having the skills to operate quadcopters is a mandatory requirement for receiving drones from the Foundation.





Defenders learned effective drone piloting, counteracting enemy electronic warfare, and other advanced technologies in dozens of training centers.

The KSE Foundation is proud to support **Victory Drones** – an ecosystem that focuses on training and supporting drone operators. Our partnership with Victory Drones and its leader, veteran Maria Berlinska, is focused on developing and implementing comprehensive training programs.

Air Intelligence Support Centre plays a crucial role in developing situation centers – technological hubs that integrate and coordinate various reconnaissance means, facilitating effective joint operations.



The KSE Foundation is committed to more than just directing targeted contributions for the procurement of equipment and pilot training; it also supports those advancing the domestic manufacturing industry

Drone developer Vitaliy Bespalenko received a grant from the KSE Foundation for his personal development.

Previously, Vitaliy had been designing drones for cargo delivery, but with the onset of a full-scale invasion, he adapted his designs to meet wartime needs, leading to the creation of an armored drone that assists sappers in surveying territories and conducting demining operations.





The development of fire-resistant polymeric-ceramic materials from basalt fibers is another innovation, led by engineer and technologist Yegor Zelenin and his team.

The KSE Foundation provided him with a financial grant to allow the inventor to focus on developing his ideas. His technology enables the creation of materials that can be used for 3D printing various drone components, enhancing the capabilities and safety of these critical tools in defense efforts.

Veteran Business: From Idea to Funding

Effective reintegration of war veterans into civilian life and support for their families lay the groundwork for Ukraine's future. Thanks to the contributions of the KSE Foundation's donor community, we have the opportunity to assist those who have defended us. In addition to educational grants for wounded Ukrainian defenders, we support them in starting their own businesses.

In July 2023, the Kyiv School of Economics and the Ministry of Economy of Ukraine initiated a collaborative effort by signing a memorandum of cooperation aimed at encouraging more veterans to launch their businesses and develop startups. This agreement laid the groundwork for the "Veteran Business: From Idea to Funding" project, which is financed by the KSE Foundation and executed by the KSE Graduate Business School.

The program provides combat veterans, individuals with disabilities due to war, and their spouses with consulting services to help them devise effective business plans, enabling them to qualify for state grants.

The Nikitchin family exemplifies the program's success.

With the support provided in formulating a business plan, they secured a state grant of 500,000 UAH, which they used to establish their own enterprise. Their startup offers a SaaS solution that allows companies to effortlessly create AI-enhanced chatbots for automating customer service functions, eliminating the need for specialized IT staff.



Startup Ecosystem

The Startup Ecosystem fosters the development of education for talented youth and integrates entrepreneurial skill development with grant support for the most successful participants. These individuals become founders of their own startups while participating in the program. The project was initiated by the KSE Graduate Business School in 2023 and launched with financial support from the KSE Foundation.

TalentTracker provides an EdTech solution for asynchronous learning, powered by Al.



III.II. Talents for Ukraine Grant Program

We have recognized and provided grant support to 150 talented Ukrainians to empower them to make Ukraine and the world a better place. "Talents for Ukraine" is a grant program initiated by the KSE Foundation. Its goal is to support a new generation of leaders by providing them with development opportunities in Ukraine despite the war.
