Nobel Laureates at KSE: A Gesture of Global Support and Scientific Solidarity

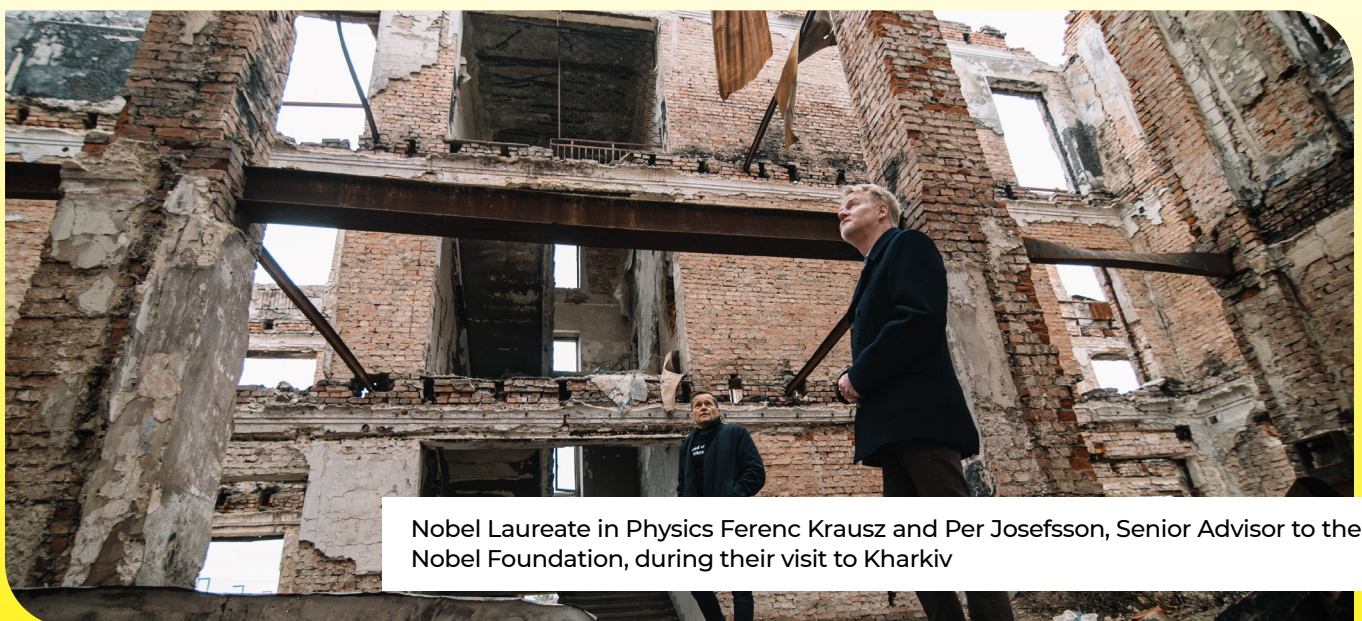
Kyiv School of Economics welcomed three Nobel Laureates – physicists Ferenc Krausz and Serge Haroche, and economist James Robinson. Their lectures, open discussions, and workshops on our campus were a powerful show of unity from the international scientific community. Together, we traveled to Kharkiv, visiting the war-damaged buildings of V. N. Karazin University and an underground school.

What followed were sincere, grounded conversations with professors and students who continue to teach and learn — despite the war. Their dedication met with international solidarity, is what sustains and strengthens Ukraine's academic environment –even in wartime. It opens new doors for Ukrainian youth and reinforces KSE as a center of academic integrity and forward - thinking education.

Education During Wartime: ZAKHYSTOK as Part of a Global Effort for the Future

In March, ZAKHYSTOK — a project launched by KSE Foundation — took a major step forward by joining the implementation of a multi-year support initiative from **Education Cannot Wait (ECW)**, the United Nations global fund for education in emergencies. The shared goal: to safeguard access to education during times of war. We're not building parallel systems or working in isolation to address learning loss. Instead, we're partnering with the **Ministry of Education and Science of Ukraine**, as well as international and civil society organizations, to foster resilience, coordination, and trust – together.

As part of this collaboration, we've started constructing four new shelters for students in regions most affected by the war. Nationwide, the ECW program will reach over **40,000 children and 12,000 teachers** in some of Ukraine's most socially vulnerable communities.

Thanks to the generosity of our donors and partners, 99 shelters are now operational — enabling 36,500 children to return to in-person learning. Safe education is not a symbolic gesture. It's a long-term investment. It's not about waiting for peace — it's about building the future, now. And we are ready to do just that.

Psychological Resilience as an Educational Priority

One of our core priorities in March was the mental health of university students. At KSE, Ukraine's First Lady Olena Zelenska presented the findings of a major study on student well-being in higher education, conducted as part of the national "How Are You?" initiative. These results provide an essential foundation for designing new models of student support across the academic sector.

Earlier, KSE Foundation launched a \$1 million grant program dedicated to mental health – with a strong focus on higher education institutions. We believe mental resilience should be treated as strategically as physical safety.

Supporting Defenders: A Strategic Partnership for Ukraine's Independence

Supporting Ukraine's armed forces is not just one of our focus areas – it's a shared responsibility for the future of the country. In March, KSE Foundation continued to stand alongside those who defend Ukraine's sovereignty and security every day – **including the Defense Intelligence of Ukraine, the First Presidential Brigade of the National Guard "Burevii," and Ukrposhta.** This is more than partnership — it's collaboration between institutions that embody resilience and help shape Ukraine's strategy for victory.

Together with Ukrposhta, we delivered **1,353 units of gear** –valued at nearly **4 million UAH** — to units of the Defense Intelligence. The funding came from the sale of a special-edition charity stamp, showing how civic action can drive real impact.

We also supplied the First Presidential Brigade with a full set of tires – essential for evacuation, redeployment, and logistics along the Kharkiv front line. In addition, we equipped defenders with **reconnaissance drones, electronic warfare systems,** power solutions, optical equipment, and other critical tools to support their missions.

We are grateful to every partner who walks this path with us. These efforts build real resilience – on the battlefield and behind it.

Thank you to everyone supporting our mission — from international organizations to Ukrainian philanthropists. Together, we are meeting today's needs while laying the foundation for a stronger, more resilient, and future-oriented Ukraine.

KEY UPDATES

Talents for Ukraine: Launch of Phase Three

In March, KSE Foundation launched the third phase of Talents for Ukraine – a grant program with an annual budget of \$1,000,000. The initiative supports talented Ukrainians committed to growth, innovation, and impact across fields such as science, the arts, civic engagement, technology, and entrepreneurship. To date, the program has supported over 300 recipients – including artists, civic leaders, astrophysicists, surgeons, and engineers.



Seven More Khan Academy STEM Courses Now Available in Ukrainian

The team behind the Ukrainian adaptation of Khan Academy has translated and localized seven new interactive STEM courses — including math, chemistry, biology, and economics. These additions bring the total number of fully localized courses to twelve, all freely available at uk.khanacademy.org. The project is led by KSE Foundation in collaboration with KSE University faculty and students.

KSE Joins the ATLAS Anti-Drone Initiative

KSE has joined the ATLAS initiative – a nationwide campaign to protect Ukraine's border by building an integrated electronic warfare system to counter enemy drones.

This “anti-drone wall” will span more than 1,300 km along the front line and is designed to neutralize UAV threats. The fundraising goal for full implementation is 5.2 billion UAH.

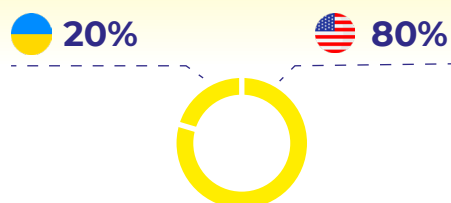

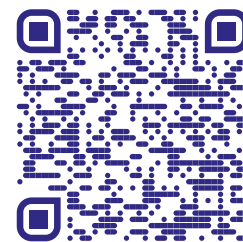

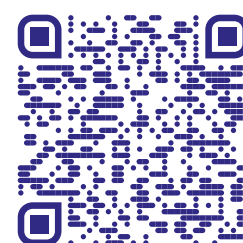
A project focused on equipping shelters in educational institutions across Ukraine. Our goal is to return as many Ukrainian children to offline lessons as
